spanien ist eine region die in der europäischen geschichte lange vernachlässigt wurde britt schlünz analysiert im zusammenspiel von zentrum und peripherie zwischen madrid katalonien dem vatikan und der kolonie kuba die konfliktreiche spanische säkularisierung des 19 jahrhunderts ihre studie stellt die klerikalen akteure in den mittelpunkt und trägt zum verständnis der schlüsselkonflikte und zentralen phänomene des jahrhunderts in europa bei den adaptionsmöglichkeiten des religiösen feldes der formierung des liberalismus und den prozessen der dekolonialisierung

karl v 1500 1558 ist eine überwältigende gestalt der geschichte rund 100 000 dokumente in sechs sprachen sind eigenhändig von ihm unterschrieben erhalten er herrschte über spanien deutschland die niederlande halb italien und große teile mittel und südamerikas kein fürst vor und nach ihm sollte mehr titel auf sich vereinen wer war dieser kaiser in dessen reich die sonne nicht unterging der ausnahmehistoriker geoffrey parker nähert sich dem kaiser multiperspektivisch und macht deutlich

dass ihm nur gerecht wird wer mehrere figuren hinter seiner person zeigt so zeichnet er das portrait des multikulturellen fürsten als jungem mann des kaisers als idealausprägung des renaissance fürsten des vielfachen königs und herrschers europas und darüber hinaus des kaisers als mythos und legendäre gestalt mit stupender quellenkenntnis und gewaltiger erzählerischer kraft entsteht so die packende biographie eines übermächtigen herrschers und das standardwerk zu karl v

die geschichte des barcelona pavilons mies van der rohe entwarf mit dem temporären ausstellungspavillon des deutschen reichs auf der weltausstellung 1929 in barcelona eine ikone der architektur aber auch ein umstrittenes monument der selbstdarstellung der weimarer republik das gebäude gehört zu den ungewöhnlichsten erfolgsgeschichten in der architektur trotz seiner kurzen existenz wuchs sein ansehen in den folgenden jahrzehnten stetig auch dank großartiger fotografien bald galt es als gebautes manifest der moderne ihrer räumlichen und ideellen ambitionen als ein meilenstein der modernen architektur ausführlich und weitreichend recherchiert stellt das vorliegende buch seine komplexe geschichte und seine politische verwicklung dar bis hin zu seiner rekonstruktion zwischen 1983 und 1986 nach den originalplänen am ursprünglichen ort die wohl wichtigste und einflussreichste architekturikone des 20 jahrhunderts einzigartig dokumentiert und dargestellt zahlreiche unveröffentlichte fotografien aus archiven in usa deutschland und spanien

this is a comprehensive study of the impact of censorship on theatre in twentieth century spain it draws on extensive archival evidence vivid personal testimonies and in depth analysis of legislation to document the different kinds of theatre censorship practised during the second republic 1931 6 the civil war 1936 9 the franco dictatorship 1939 75 and the transition to democracy 1975 85 changes in criteria administrative structures and personnel from these periods are traced in relation to wider political social and cultural developments and the responses of playwrights directors and companies are explored with a focus on censorship new light is cast on particular theatremakers and their work the conditions in which all kinds of theatre were produced the construction of genres and canons as well as on broader cultural history and changing ideological climate all of which are linked to reflections on the nature of censorship and the relationship between culture and the state

what s in a nineteenth century philanthropist fear of an uprising but the frightened philanthropist has a remedy aware that the urban surge of the working class masses in spain would create a state of emergency he or she devises a means to seduce the masses away from rebellion by taking on himself or herself the role of the seducer the capitalist intellectual hero invested in the caretaking of the unpredictable working class intellectual philanthropy examines cultural practices used by philanthropists in modern iberia it explains the meaning and role of intellectual philanthropy by focusing on the devices and apparatuses philanthropists devised to realize their projects intellectual philanthropists considered themselves activists in that they aimed to impact social structures and deployed a rhetoric of the affect to convince the workers to join their philanthropic enterprise philanthropy in the nineteenth century was not necessarily linked to money motivations could be moral or political they could arise from a desire to enhance social status or to acquire influence to explicitly designate this conceptualization of the philanthropic act the author proposes its own name intellectual philanthropy intellectual philanthropy is the use of philanthropic platforms by intellectuals to deploy cultural and educational structures in which workers could acquire a cultural capital constructed and organized by the philanthropists vialette argues that intellectual philanthropy appeared as a reaction to the feared political and cultural organization of the working class rather than as a process of worker emancipation these philanthropic processes aimed at organizing the workers emotionally and rationally into what she calls micro societies philanthropists used the technique of seduction and expressed love to and for a targeted class however this seduction prevented real communication and created a moral and symbolic indebtedness this process was perverse in that through its cultural and educational structures philanthropy would give workers cultural capital that was not just emancipatory but also a way to restrict their agency

nomadic new women exile and border crossing between spain and the americas early to mid twentieth century examines how gender and sexuality border crossing and exile intersect in women s intellectual and artistic practices during the volatile historical period of the first half of the twentieth century in and around spain and the americas each of the twelve chapters in this highly interdisciplinary volume analyzes the combined impact of gender and sexual identity and the traversing of particular national and world regional boundaries on creative work together and separately the contributors push the limits of past and present research on exile and migration displacement and nomadism to reveal how the complex interrelationships among gender sexuality and cultural production come under intense pressure by the crossing of borders

the age of mass child removal in spain analyses the ideas and practices that underpinned the age of mass child removal this era emerged from growing criticisms across the world of dangerous parents and the developing belief in the nineteenth century that the state could provide superior guardianship to unfit parents in the late nineteenth century the juvenile court movement led the way in forging a new and more efficient system of child removal that severely curtailed the previously highly protected sovereignty of guardians deemed dangerous this transnational movement rapidly established courts across the world and used them to train the personnel and create the systems that frequently lay behind mass child removal spaniards formed a significant part of this transnational movement and the country s juvenile courts became involved in the three main areas of removal that characterize the age the taking of children from poor families from families displaced by war and from political opponents the study of spanish case files reveals much about how the removal process worked in practice across time and across democratic regimes and dictatorships these cases also afford an insight into the rich array of child removal practices that lay between the poles of coercion and victimhood accordingly the study offers a history of some of most marginalized parents and children and recaptures their voice agency and experience peter anderson also analyses the removal of tens of thousands of children from general franco s political opponents sometimes referred to as the lost children of francoism through the history and practice of the juvenile courts

maricas traces the erotic lives and legal battles of argentine and spanish queer people who despite state repression and sexual violence carved out their own spaces in metropolitan and rural cultures between the 1940s and the 1980s

the news media have given us potent demonstrations of the ambiguity of ostensibly truthful representations of public events jordana mendelson uses this ambiguity as a framework for the study of spanish visual culture from 1929 to 1939 a decade marked on the one hand by dictatorship civil war and franco s rise to power and on the other by a surge in the production of documentaries of various types from films and photographs to international exhibitions mendelson begins with an examination of el pueblo español a model spanish village featured at the 1929 international exposition in barcelona she then discusses buñuel s and dalí s documentary films relating them not only to french surrealism but also to issues of rural tradition in the formation of regional and national identities her highly original book concludes with a discussion of the 1937 spanish pavilion where picasso s famed painting of the fascist bombing of a basque town guernica was exhibited along with monumental photomurals by josep renau based upon years of archival research mendelson s book opens a new perspective on the cultural politics of a turbulent era in modern spain it explores the little known yet rich intersection between avant garde artists and government institutions it shows as well the surprising extent to which spanish modernity was fashioned through dialogue between the seemingly opposed fields of urban and rural fine art and mass culture

landscape nature and the body politic explores the origins and lasting influences of two contesting but intertwined discourses that persist today when we use the words landscape country scenery nature national in the first sense the land is a physical and bounded body of terrain upon which the nation state is constructed e g the purple mountain majesties above the fruited plain from sea to shining sea in the second the country is constituted through its people and established through time and precedence e g land where our fathers died land of the pilgrims pride kenneth robert olwig s extended exploration of these discourses is a masterful work of scholarship both broad and deep which opens up new avenues of thinking in the areas of geography literature theater history political science law and environmental studies olwig tracks these ideas though anglo american history starting with seventeenth century conflicts between the stuart kings and the english parliament and the stuart dream of uniting scotland with england and wales into one nation on the island of britain he uses a royal production of a ben jonson masque with stage sets by architect inigo jones as a touchstone for exploring how the notion of landscape expands from artful stage scenery to a geopolitical ideal olwig pursues these contested concepts of the body politic from europe to america and to global politics illuminating a host of topics from national parks and environmental planning to theories of polity and virulent nationalistic movements

this book analyzes the decay of liberal politics in spain as the regional version of the general crisis that engulfed most of europe between 1916 and 1923 romero enriches the important wider debate about this watershed period of european history when in the face of unprecedented mass social protest and political mobilization incumbent governing elites struggled to find a valid formula of social containment in the dawning of mass politics which also saw the spread of the radical new doctrines of bolshevism and fascism above all this book examines spain s crisis of modernization a process marked by complex social and political realignments through which the nature of civil society was profoundly altered it resulted in an unprecedented spiral of violence and a polarization that firstly led to an authoritarian formula of social control in 1923 and ultimately to the outbreak of civil war in 1936

georges bizet s carmen and its staging of an exoticized spain was progressively reimagined between its 1875 paris premiere and 1915 this book explores carmen s dynamic interaction with spanishness in this cosmopolitan age of spectacle across operatic productions parodies and theatrical adaptations from spain to paris london and new york

visual propaganda exhibitions and the spanish civil war is a history of art during wartime that analyzes images in various media that circulated widely and were encountered daily by spaniards on city walls in print and in exhibitions tangible elements of the nation s past monuments cultural property and art historical icons were displayed in temporary exhibitions and museums as well as reproduced on posters and in print media to rally the population define national identity and reinvent distant and recent history artists political party propagandists and government administrators believed that images on the street in print and in exhibitions would create a community of viewers brought together during the staging of public exhibitions to understand their own roles as spaniards this book draws on extensive archival research brings to light unpublished documents and examines visual propaganda exhibitions and texts unavailable in english it engages with questions of national self definition and historical memory at their intersections with the fine arts visual culture exhibition history tourism and propaganda during the spanish civil war and immediate post war period as well as contemporary responses to the contested legacy of the spanish civil war it will be of interest to scholars in art history visual and cultural history history and museum studies

most histories of the spanish civil war 1936 1939 have examined major leaders or well established political and social groups to explore class gender and ideological struggles the war in spain was marked by momentous conflicts between democracy and dictatorship communism and fascism anarchism and authoritarianism and catholicism and anticlericalism that still provoke our fascination in republic of egos michael seidman focuses instead on the personal and individual experiences of the common men and women who were actors in a struggle that defined a generation and helped to shape our world by examining the roles of anonymous individuals families and small groups who fought for their own interests and survival and not necessarily for an abstract or revolutionary cause seidman reveals a powerful but rarely considered pressure on the outcome of history he shows how price controls and inflation in the republican zone encouraged peasant hoarding black marketing and unrest among urban workers soldiers of the republican army responded to material shortages by looting deserting and fraternizing with the enemy seidman s focus on average seemingly nonpolitical individuals provides a new vision of both the experience and outcome of the war

using multiple languages numerous archives press reports oral histories letters and memoirs stalin s niños investigates the well resourced boarding schools designed specifically for nearly 3 000 child refugees from the spanish civil war

museums modernity and conflict examines the history of the relationship between museums collections and war revealing how museums have responded to and been shaped by war and conflicts of various sorts written by a mixture of museum professionals and academics and ranging across europe north america and the middle east this book examines the many ways in which museums were affected by major conflicts such as the world wars considers how and why they attempted to contribute to the war effort analyses how wartime collecting shaped the nature of the objects held by a variety of museums and demonstrates how museums of war and of the military came into existence during this period closely focused around conflicts which had the most wide ranging impact on museums this collection includes reflections on museums such as the louvre the stedelijk in the netherlands the canadian war museum and the state art collections dresden museums modernity and conflict will be of interest to academics and students worldwide particularly those engaged in the study of museums war and history showing how the past continues to shape contemporary museum work in a variety of different and sometimes unexpected ways the book will also be of interest to museum practitioners

the tragedy that devastated spain for 33 months from july 1936 to april 1939 was first and foremost a brutal fratricidal conflict the product of the fatal clash between diametrically opposed views of spain and an attempt to settle crucial issues which had divided spaniards for generations agrarian reform recognition of the identity of the historical regions catalonia the basque country and the roles of the catholic church and the armed forces in a modern state being a war between spaniards it was particularly brutal but it was also part of the broader move toward war in europe and thus sucked in many volunteers from abroad and it left a deep imprint since general francisco franco remained at the helm of the country until his death in 1975 the historical dictionary of the spanish civil war covers the history of the war first through a long chronology which highlights the major steps from the incubation to the conclusion the overall situation is summed up in the introduction then the dictionary section fleshes it out with over 600 entries on persons places events institutions battles and campaigns more reading can be found in an extensive bibliography this book is an excellent access point for students researchers and anyone wanting to know more about the spanish civil war

now available in english for the first time gunpowder and incense translated from the spanish la pólvora y el incienso chronicles the role of the church in spanish politics looking in particular at the spanish civil war unlike most books on the subject hilari raguer looks beyond the traditional explanation that the war was primarily a religious struggle his writing presents an exemplary insider s perspective and is notable for its balance and perception on the role of the catholic church before during and after the war the material is presented in a lucid elegant manner which makes this book as readable as it is historiographically important it will be vital reading for students and scholars of european religious and modern history

spain and the great powers in the twentieth centuryexamines the international context to and influences on spanish history and politics from 1898 to the present day spanish history is necessarily international with the significance of spain s neutrality in the first world war and the global influences on the outcome of the spanish civil war taking the defeat in the spanish american war of 1898 as a starting point the book includes surveys on the crisis of neutrality during the first world war nazi germany and franco s spain spain and the cold war relations with the united states this book traces the important topic of modern spanish diplomacy up to the present day
