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bob fosse 1927 1987 is recognized as one of the most significant figures in post world war ii american
 musical theater with his first broadway musical the pajama game in 1954 the fosse style was already fully
 developed with its trademark hunched shoulders turned in stance and stuttering staccato jazz movements
 fosse moved decisively into the role of director with redhead in 1959 and was a key figure in the rise of the
 director choreographer in the broadway musical he also became the only star director of musicals of his
 era a group that included jerome robbins gower champion michael kidd and harold prince to equal his
 broadway success in films following his unprecedented triple crown of show business awards in 1973 an
 oscar for cabaret emmy for liza with a z and tony for pippin fosse assumed complete control of virtually
 every element of his projects but when at last he had achieved complete autonomy his final efforts the film
 star 80 and the musical big deal written and directed by fosse were rejected by audiences and critics a
 fascinating look at the evolution of fosse as choreographer and director big deal bob fosse and dance in the
 american musical considers fosse s career in the context of changes in the broadway musical theater over
 four decades it traces his early dance years and the importance of mentors george abbott and jerome

neil simon 1927 2018 began as a writer for some of the leading comedians of the day including jackie gleason red buttons phil silvers and jerry lewis and he wrote for fabled television programs alongside a group of writers that included mel brooks woody allen larry gelbart michael stewart and sid caesar after television simon embarked on a playwriting career in the next four decades he saw twenty eight of his plays and five musicals produced on broadway thirteen of those plays and three of the musicals ran for more than five hundred performances he was even more widely known for his screenplays some twenty five in all yet despite this success it was not until his bb trilogy brighton beach memoirs biloxi blues and broadway bound that critics and scholars began to take simon seriously as a literary figure this change in perspective culminated in 1991 when his play lost in yonkers won the pulitzer prize for drama in the twenty two interviews included in conversations with neil simon simon talks candidly about what it was like to write commercially successful plays that were dismissed by critics and scholars he also speaks at length about the differences between writing for television for the stage and for film he speaks openly and often revealingly about his relationships with among many others mike nichols walter matthau sid caesar and jack lemmon above all these interviews reveal neil simon as a writer who thought long and intelligently about creating for stage film and television and about dealing with serious subjects in a comic mode in so doing conversations with neil simon compels us to recognize neil simon s genius

karetnikova urges film students to work on their own screenplays while studying her book reading the suggested scripts and viewing the films based on them to get the most from her method she provides a series of exercises for each chapter to help students master the skills of composing and writing film treatments developing screen stories and their characters organizing scenes and writing dialogue each of the exercises has worked successfully in her own screenplay writing classes

bob fosse 1927-1987 the director and choreographer of chicago and sweet charity has never been more popular than he is right now here is the less publicized side of his story his surprising ascent from the world of sleazy chicago strip joints to the glitter of broadway a legend s memory is preserved in this eloquent biography

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captivated by the dark rider embittered by injustice ross durden leads a double life gentleman farmer by

day roguish highwayman by night he has sworn to right the wrongs of the past but danger lurks around every corner not least when he sets eyes on the beautiful daughter of his sworn enemy

these highbrows must remember that there is a demand for little things as well as for big things george bernard shaw was one of the leading playwrights and public intellectuals of the nineteenth and twentieth centuries he helped propel drama towards the unexpected into a realm where it might shock audiences into new viewpoints and into fresh understandings of society throughout his long writing career shaw wrote short plays ranging in length from 1000 word puppet play shakes versus shaw to the 12 000 word suffragette comedy press cuttings these plays can be taken to illuminate shaw s life and legacy from ideas about war and patriotism in o flaherty v c to censorship in the shewing up of blanco posset surveying shaw s entire career of writing short dramas focusing especially on those years when his work in the form was particularly prolific around 1909 and during the first world war this collection places shaw s short plays broadly into four key areas farces historical sketches war dramas and shakespearean shorts for each of these areas the volume explores shaw s aesthetic and thematic concerns the precise historical and generic contexts in which the works were written the major criticism and scholarship that has subsequently emerged and the most notable stage and screen productions this collection reveals how a playwright often criticized for being too wordy was actually a master of the short form

The cinema of the unsettling, unlike its horror counterpart, doesn't rely on jump scares or graphic violence to elicit a response. Instead, it cultivates a pervasive sense of unease, a creeping dread that lingers long after the credits roll. It's a subtle art form, manipulating atmosphere, ambiguity, and psychological suggestion to create a feeling of discomfort and disquiet that burrows deep into the viewer's subconscious. This article will explore the key elements that define this unique cinematic experience, providing examples and illustrating its distinctive characteristics.

1. The Power of Ambiguity and Suggestion: Leaving Things Unsaid

The unsettling relies heavily on what it doesn't show. Unlike horror, which often presents explicit threats, the cinema of the unsettling thrives on implication and suggestion. A shadowy figure glimpsed at the edge of the frame, a whispered dialogue barely audible, a subtle shift in the soundtrack – these are the building blocks of its unsettling power. The viewer is left to fill in the blanks, their imagination conjuring far more terrifying possibilities than anything explicitly depicted on screen. Consider the lingering unease in films like *The Babadook* (2014), where the monster's true nature is left partially undefined, amplifying its psychological impact. The ambiguity fuels the viewer's anxiety, making the experience intensely personal.

2. The Slow Burn: Building Tension Gradually

The cinema of the unsettling eschews immediate shocks. Instead, it meticulously builds tension over time, gradually ratcheting up the sense of unease. This slow burn approach allows the audience to become increasingly invested in the unsettling atmosphere, making the eventual "reveal" (if there even is one) far more impactful. The film *The Shining* (1980), while containing moments of horror, excels in its masterful use of slow-burn tension, utilizing long takes, unsettling sound design, and Jack Nicholson's increasingly erratic behaviour to cultivate a pervasive sense of dread. The prolonged exposure to unsettling visuals and sounds slowly erodes the viewer's sense of security.

3. Psychological Manipulation: Playing with the Mind

The unsettling often delves into the psychological landscape of its characters, exploring themes of paranoia, isolation, and mental fragility. By focusing on the internal struggles of its protagonists, the films create a sense of vulnerability and shared anxiety. The viewer is invited to question their own perceptions and sanity alongside the characters on screen, leading to a more deeply disturbing and personal experience. This is evident in films like *Rosemary's Baby* (1968), where the protagonist's increasing paranoia is subtly mirrored by the unsettling events unfolding around her, leaving the audience questioning the reality of what they are witnessing.

4. Atmosphere and Sound Design: Creating a Sense of Place

The unsettling relies heavily on the creation of a palpable atmosphere. This is achieved through carefully crafted cinematography, utilizing shadows, unusual angles, and unsettling colour palettes. Equally crucial is the sound design, employing unsettling soundscapes, dissonant music, and unexpected silences to amplify the sense of dread. The unnerving soundscape in *The Blair Witch Project* (1999), characterized by its unsettling use of ambient noise and sudden, jarring sounds, is a prime example. This effectively contributes to the pervasive atmosphere of dread and isolation.

5. The Uncanny Valley: Familiar Yet Disturbing

The unsettling often employs elements of the uncanny valley – that unsettling feeling we get when something is almost, but not quite, right. A slightly off-kilter performance, an unsettlingly familiar setting, or a distorted image can all contribute to this sense of unease. The subtle creepiness in *Don't Look Now* (1973), where the mundane blends with the increasingly disturbing, is a perfect example of utilizing the uncanny to effectively generate unease. The audience never feels entirely safe or comfortable, even in seemingly normal scenes.
