

## Angels In America Script

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the period of young adulthood from ages 18 to 23 is popularly considered the most sexualized in life but is it true what do we really know about the sexual lives of young people today premarital sex in america combines illuminating personal stories and comprehensive research surveys to provide the fullest portrait of heterosexuality among young adults ever produced mark regnerus and jeremy uecker draw upon a wealth of survey data as well as scores of in depth interviews with young adults from around the country both in and out of college digging underneath stereotypes and unexamined assumptions the authors offer compelling and often surprising answers to such questions as how do the emotional aspects of sexual relations differ between young men and women what role do political orientations play in their sexual relations how have online dating and social networking sites affected the relationships of emerging adults why are young people today waiting so much longer to marry how prevalent are nontraditional forms of sex and what do people think of them to better understand what drives the sexual behaviors of emerging adults regnerus and uecker pay special attention to two important concepts sexual scripts the unwritten and often unconscious rules that guide sexual behavior and attitudes and sexual economics a theory which suggests that the relative scarcity of men on college campuses contributes to the hookup culture by allowing men to diminish their level of commitment and thereby lower the price they have to pay for sex for anyone wishing to understand how sexual relations between young adults have changed and are changing premarital sex in america will serve as a touchstone for years to come

how race is made in america examines mexican americans from 1924 when american law drastically reduced immigration into the united states to 1965 when many quotas were abolished to understand how broad themes of race and citizenship are constructed these years shaped the emergence of what natalia molina describes as an immigration regime which defined the racial categories that continue to influence perceptions in the united states about mexican americans race and ethnicity molina demonstrates that despite the multiplicity of influences that help shape our concept of race common themes prevail examining legal political social and cultural sources related to immigration she advances the theory that our understanding of race is socially constructed in relational ways that is in correspondence to other groups molina introduces and explains her central theory racial scripts which highlights the ways in which the lives of racialized groups are linked across time

and space and thereby affect one another how race is made in america also shows that these racial scripts are easily adopted and adapted to apply to different racial groups

in a social cinema film making and politics in america brian neve presents a study of the social and political nature of american film by concentrating on a generation of writers from the thirties who directed films in hollywood in the 1940 s he discusses how they negotiated their roles in relation to the studio system itself undergoing change and to what extent their experience in the political and theatre movements of thirties new york was to be reflected in their later films focusing in particular on orson welles elia kazan jules dassin abraham polonsky nicholas ray robert rossen and joseph losey neve relates the work of these writers and directors to the broader industrial bureaucratic social and political developments of the period 1935 1970 with special emphasis on the post war decade bringing together archive and secondary sources neve explores a lost tradition of social filmmaking in america

european intellectuals of the 1950s dismissed american culture as nothing more than cowboy movies and the a bomb in response american cultural diplomats tried to show that the united states had something to offer beyond military might and commercial exploitation through literary magazines traveling art exhibits touring musical shows radio programs book translations and conferences they deployed the revolutionary aesthetics of modernism to prove particularly to the leftists whose cold war loyalties they hoped to secure that american art and literature were aesthetically rich and culturally significant yet by repurposing modernism american diplomats and cultural authorities turned the avant garde into the establishment they remade the once revolutionary movement into a content free collection of artistic techniques and styles suitable for middlebrow consumption cold war modernists documents how the cia the state department and private cultural diplomats transformed modernist art and literature into pro western propaganda during the first decade of the cold war drawing on interviews previously unknown archival materials and the stories of such figures and institutions as william faulkner stephen spender irving kristol james laughlin and voice of america barnhisel reveals how the u s government reconfigured modernism as a trans atlantic movement a joint endeavor between american and european artists with profound implications for the art that followed and for the character of american identity

a notable example of radio at its best back stage shoot in 1954 james thurber wrote you can count on the thumb of one hand the american who is at once a comedian a humorist a wit and a satirist and his name is fred allen several decades after his death and more than forty years since his radio program left the air fred allen s reputation as a respected humorist remains intact in this book alan havig explores the roots of his comedy the themes it exploited the problems and challenges that faced the radio comedy writer and allen s unique success with the one dimensional medium of radio tracing a career that lasted from 1912 into the 1950s and encompassed vaudeville Broadway revues movies radio and television havig describes the verbal slapstick style that was fred allen s hallmark and legacy to american comedy more than a biography of fred allen this is a study of the development of the radio industry a discussion of american humor and the story of how one relates to the other using a wide variety of published and unpublished sources including the allen papers havig analyzes allen s radio comedy of the 1930s and 40s within the context of the peculiar advantages and limitations of radio as a medium for comedy he argues that allen did not merely transfer vaudeville routines to a non visual medium as did eddie cantor ed wynn and others allen developed a comedic style that depended on word play sound effects and on his audience s ability and readiness to imagine a visual world in which his eccentric characters operated havig illustrates his story with numerous examples of allen s humor with fascinating anecdotes and excerpts from radio broadcasts in accounting for the comedian s success he deals with vaudeville comedy writing sponsor s demands and censorship of material and the organizational world of radio broadcasting companies describing radio as an instrument of wit fred allen wrote on radio you could do subtle writing because you had access to the imagination that was why i liked radio we had some fun readers will also have some fun remembering or discovering for the first time allen s alley and the magic of radio comedy in its prime fred was one of the greatest of vaudeville and radio comedians anyone even casually

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# Spinach Paper Chromatography: Separating Plant Pigments

Paper chromatography is a simple yet powerful technique used to separate mixtures of substances. This article focuses on applying this technique to extract and separate the different pigments found in spinach leaves, a visually engaging and accessible example for educational purposes. Through this experiment, we can visually observe the different pigments present in spinach and understand their relative properties, providing a practical application of chemical principles.

## 1. The Chemistry of Spinach Pigments

Spinach leaves, like many green plants, contain a variety of pigments responsible for their color and vital photosynthetic processes. The most prominent are chlorophylls (chlorophyll a and chlorophyll b), which are responsible for the green color. These are magnesium-containing porphyrin compounds that absorb light energy in the red and blue regions of the spectrum. Spinach also contains carotenoids, a group of pigments including carotenes (like beta-carotene, giving carrots their orange color) and xanthophylls (like lutein and zeaxanthin, contributing yellow and orange hues). Carotenoids absorb light in the blue and green regions, complementing the chlorophyll's absorption. The different pigments have varying polarities and solubilities, allowing us to separate them using chromatography.

## 2. Materials and Procedure: Setting up the Chromatography

Conducting spinach paper chromatography requires readily available materials. Here's a list: Spinach leaves: Fresh spinach leaves provide the best results. Solvent: A mixture of petroleum ether (or a safer alternative like hexane), acetone, and isopropyl alcohol is typically used. The specific ratio depends on the desired separation; a common ratio is 8:1:1. Caution: Petroleum ether is highly flammable and should be handled in a well-ventilated area, away from open flames. Alternatives should be chosen where possible and proper safety measures should always be followed. Beaker: A tall, narrow beaker or jar to hold the solvent. Filter paper: Whatman #1 filter paper or similar chromatography paper is ideal. Mortar and pestle: To grind the spinach leaves. Sand: A small amount to help grind the leaves and improve pigment extraction. Pencil: To mark the chromatography paper. Avoid pens as the ink may dissolve. Ruler: To measure distances. Gloves: To protect your hands from the solvent. Procedure: 1. Extract the Pigments: Grind a small amount of spinach leaves with sand in a mortar and pestle. Add a small amount of solvent to create a spinach paste. 2. Apply the Extract: Using a capillary tube or toothpick, carefully apply a small spot of the spinach extract near the bottom edge of the filter paper, allowing it to dry completely before applying another spot (repeat 3-4 times for better results). This concentrated spot is called the origin. 3. Develop the Chromatogram: Carefully place the filter paper into the beaker, ensuring the bottom edge is submerged in the solvent, but the pigment spot remains above the

solvent level. The solvent should be just below the pigment spot level. Seal the beaker with parafilm or aluminum foil to create a saturated atmosphere. 4. Observe and Measure: As the solvent moves up the filter paper (via capillary action), the different pigments will separate based on their differing polarities and solubilities. The more soluble and less polar pigments will move further up the paper. Observe the separated bands of color and measure their distance from the origin. 5. Calculate Rf Values: The Retention Factor (Rf) value is calculated for each pigment:  $Rf = (\text{distance traveled by pigment}) / (\text{distance traveled by solvent})$ . Rf values are characteristic for specific pigments in a particular solvent system.

### 3. Interpreting the Results: Understanding Pigment Separation

Once the solvent front reaches near the top of the paper, remove the chromatography paper and mark the solvent front with a pencil. You should observe distinct bands of color, representing the separated pigments. Typically, a yellow-green band (chlorophyll b) will be closer to the origin, followed by a blue-green band (chlorophyll a), and then orange and yellow bands (carotenoids) further up. The relative distances of each band will differ slightly depending on the solvent system and the paper used. Calculating the Rf values for each band allows for comparison and identification of the pigments.

### 4. Applications and Extensions

Spinach paper chromatography provides a hands-on learning experience in various scientific principles, including separation techniques, polarity, solubility, and photosynthesis. This experiment can be extended to explore different plant materials, solvents, or even investigate the effects of environmental factors on pigment production. The technique also has practical applications in analyzing food quality, identifying plant species, and studying the effects of environmental stressors on plant health.

### Summary

Spinach paper chromatography is a simple, effective, and visually engaging technique demonstrating the separation of plant pigments based on their chemical properties. By using readily available materials, this experiment allows students to observe and analyze the different pigments in spinach leaves, enhancing their understanding of chromatography, polarity, and photosynthetic pigments. The calculated Rf values provide quantitative data for comparison and further investigation.
